Control Theories .Look at crime and delinquency differently - Ask why people refrain from violating the law even though they are presented with opportunities to commit crime Control theories attempt to find factors that keep an individual from becoming deviant

Social Control Theory • Hirschi (1969) Social Control Theory • Also referred to as Social Bond Theory, or Bonding Theory • Assumes an individual's behavior is controlled by connections a person has to a conventional social order. Main premise • Delinquent acts result when an individual's bond to society is weak or broken

Commitment to conventional lines of action • Desire to achieve conventional goals will reduce delinquency because it will make achieving those goals more difficult • 3 areas to illustrate the concept

Belief (of laws or rules). Our belief system pertaining to laws and rules governs behavior · An absence of effective beliefs that forbid or discourage delinquency allows for such behavior to occur Self-Control Theory (Theory of Low Self-Control) -Gottfredson and Hirschi 's (1990) A General Theory of Crime Self-control accounts for a difference in the extent to which people are vulnerable to temptations • Provides a barrier between the momentary benefits of

Self-control • Established early in life (completed around age 8), and is theorized to be constant over the life course • The result of "effective child rearing practices" • Parenting involves suppressing impulsive behavior of kids and making a child responsible for his/her actions
