Angelus began as a series of short stories written to take my mind off myself when things got too difficult to handle the acute pain in my body. People always say that we write about what we are familiar with; for me that is pain and loss, recovery and the true love of a family. My life has never been an easy one, but those in my life have made my illness something I can and am willing to endure for the sake of the most wonderful family, and some truly amazing friends. But even beyond this is my love for my Lord who has taught me some very hard lessons, with love and gentleness, and taught me that tragedy and circumstance are not the end of the world. As long as He holds my hand, all things are possible. I hope you enjoy the stories in this collection of tales. Each one of them spoke to me in a way that made them touch something in my heart. Places in my heart, long thought forgotten, wrote the tales you have before you. They came to me as whole complete stories. Penance, however, was different. Penance was the very first story I ever wrote, scribbling away madly before I lost the train of thought. I was stuck in bed for nearly four years and then, confined to a wheelchair for about the same length of time. Pain was my constant companion, and without any medication for the pain that tore through my body, I ended up cutting myself, scarring myself permanently, or hacking off my hair in a misguided attempt to release the pain from my body. It was during this time in my life that Penance was written. Even now, it touches my heart in a way no other story I have written, ever has. Plague was set in a time of peace after the country had been at war so long. The fictionalized account an obvious result of too much death in the Welsh Countryside during a certain King's reign made up the basis for this tale. Especially with the historical documents telling of the amazing faith of the folk at that time. The Rocker tells of an old married couple who have loved each other through joy and pain, hardship and happiness and their Angelus have shared everything with them. feelings are stunted. He makes a terrible decision, but things are not as they would seem. Faith Like a Child this story was about the good and the bad in good people. Even people who would ordinarily be reasonable harbor grudges that have unforeseen consequences. And during the time of Nero, a man who committed great wrong find his way to the light. The Cobbler is about the faithful service of a now very old man and an unusual messenger from the Lord who has cared for the old man all his life. The stories are very different from each other and tell the stories of how God's messengers are working behind the scenes keeping his people safe and helping us to love the unlovable. The stories are sad, and happy, poignant and at times, sentimental. I do pray they make your heart glad.

#### Librum Angelus

This is a collection of new essays on the religious themes in, and the implications of, the works of Joss Whedon, creator of such shows as Buffy the Vampire Slayer, Angel, and Firefly, and more recently writer and director of the box-office hit Marvel's The Avengers. The book addresses such topics as ethics, racism, feminism, politics, witchcraft, spiritual transformation, identity, community, heroism, apocalypse, and other theologically significant themes of Whedon's creative enterprises. The disciplinary approaches vary as well; history, theology, philosophy of religion, phenomenology, cultural studies, and religious studies are all employed. The various essay authors differ in that some are clearly believers in God, some are clearly not, and others leave that matter aside.

#### Joss Whedon and Religion

Modernism, Ruben Darío, and the Poetics of Despair presents a detailed study of a neglected facet of Ruben Darío, and in general, of Hispanic Modernism: metaphysical and existential dimensions as preludes to Modernity. Alberto Acereda and J. Rigoberto Guevara approach the life and death issues in Darío works with special emphasis on his poetry. The authors demonstrate how the Nicaraguan poet takes the first steps towards poetic modernity. The tragic component of Darío works are examined in the light of Nineteenth Century philosophy, especially the work of Arthur Schopenhauer. Various thematic proposals are also formulated for the study of the works of Ruben Darío.

#### Modernism, Rubén Darío, and the Poetics of Despair

This book provides a highly original approach to the writings of the twentieth-century German philosopher Walter Benjamin by one of his most distinguished readers. It develops the idea of 'working with' Benjamin, seeking both to read his corpus and to put it to work - to show how a reading of Benjamin can open up issues that may not themselves be immediately at stake in his texts. The defining elements in Benjamin's writings that Andrew Benjamin isolates - history, experience, translation, technical reproducibility and politics - are put to work; that is, their utility is established in engaging the works of others. The question is how utility is understood. As Andrew Benjamin argues, utility involves demonstrating the different ways in which Benjamin is a central thinker within the project of understanding the nature of modernity. This is best achieved by noting connections and points of differentiation between his work and the writings of Adorno and Heidegger. However, the more demanding project is that 'working with' Benjamin necessitates deploying the implicit assumptions within his writings as well as demanding of his formulations more than is provided by their initial presentation. What is at stake is not the application of Benjamin's thought. Rather what counts is its use. Working with Benjamin engages with the themes central to Benjamin's work with deftness, daring and critical insight while at the same time situating those themes within current academic and cultural debates.
