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Poem a Day: Vol. 1

Once upon a time men and women of sense and sensibility knew by heart dozens of poems - Shakespeare's sonnets, stirring patriotic verse, odes to churchyards and elegies for the departed, the music of Swinburne or Poe or Yeats. Poems are meant to be voiced and A Poem a Day includes 366 poems old and new - one for each day of the year - worth learning by heart. Only two criteria were demanded of each poem for inclusion in this collection - it had to be short enough to learn in a day, and good enough to stand among the great poetry of the English language, from Chaucer to Sylvia Plath. A Poem a Day is a book for the bedside. It contains many of the most familiar poems in the language and others that will come as a surprise. Most are complete and most are short, easily contained in a single page. But a few are substantial works, like Thomas Gray's "Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard" and Rudyard Kipling's "Gunga Din." Some have been read by every high school student (Andrew Marvel, "To His Coy Mistress") while others will be new to most readers (Thomas Hardy, "The Voice"). But all share the compression and charged meaning which are the soul of poetry. In its British version the book went through seven printings in a year and was a bestseller. Now Karen McCosker has added a new foreword and fifty new poems for an American audience willing to make poetry a part of life.

Poem a Day: Vol. 3

The companion volumes to this new collection — Poem a Day: Volume 1 and Poem a Day: Volume 2 — have together sold nearly a hundred thousand copies. They are a word-of-mouth sensation among those who want poetry to be a greater presence in their lives, and perennial gift-giving favorites. Like its predecessors, Poem a Day: Volume 3 offers a verse for each day of the year (including February 29) along with brief, often amusing, always interesting anecdotes about the poets and their poems. The original Poem a Day was the brainchild of Englishman Nicholas Albery, a colorful and charismatic figure whose interests ranged from social inventions to a greener environment. He had already commenced work on this volume when he died tragically in a car crash. A foundation was created in his memory, and his friends and colleagues at the Nicholas Albery Foundation completed the work.

Enter the depths of my mind and soul with caution, beware of the puns and metaphors that will attack and watch out for the alliterations and similes that may crawl underneath your feet. Prepare to read between what may seem to be the simplest of lines as each word that has been poured into each poem is a masterpiece on its own. Welcome to A Poem A Day.

Shanghai winters, a winter in Katowice, a summer day with ghosts, blue shadows, petals in the darkness, an "empty lane lit up by moonlight"—the poems of this extraordinary volume illuminate the inner life as a singular encounter between physical and spiritual realms.

A Summer Day in the Company of Ghosts

Sylvia Plath (1932-1963) was one of the writers that defined the course of twentieth-century poetry. Her vivid, daring and complex poetry continues to captivate new generations of readers and writers. In the *Letters*, we discover the art of Plath's correspondence, most of which has never before been published and is here presented unabridged, without revision, so that she speaks directly in her own words. Refreshingly candid and offering intimate details of her personal life, Plath is playful, too, entertaining a wide range of addressees, including family, friends and professional contacts, with inimitable wit and verve. The letters document Plath's extraordinary literary development: the genesis of many poems, short and long fiction, and journalism. Her endeavour to publish in a variety of genres had mixed receptions, but she was never dissuaded. Through acceptance of her work, and rejection, Plath strove to stay true to her creative vision. Well-read and curious, she offers a fascinating commentary on contemporary culture. Leading Plath scholars Peter K. Steinberg and Karen V. Kukil, editor of *The Journals of Sylvia Plath 1950-1962*, provide comprehensive footnotes and an extensive index informed by their meticulous research. Alongside a selection of photographs and Plath's own line-drawings, the editors masterfully contextualise what the pages disclose. This selection of early correspondence marks the key moments of Plath's adolescence, including childhood hobbies and high school boyfriends; her successful but turbulent undergraduate years at Smith College; the move to England and Cambridge University; and her meeting and marrying Ted Hughes, including a trove of unseen letters post-honeymoon, revealing their extraordinary creative partnership.

July 2018 marks the 70th anniversary of the National Health Service Act. in July 1948. *To Provide All People* is a work that excavates what the N.H.S. represents and means - on a personal and national level - and paints an authentic, tonal picture of a rare social phenomenon, illuminating with exquisite sensitivity and power why the ethos at its heart should always be protected.

Rhythm of the Day

Written between the years 1944 and 1947 by the visionary Maria Valtorta, *The Poem of the Man-God* (recently retitled in its original Italian to "The Gospel As Revealed to Me") is considered one of the greatest works of private revelation to date. Penned in the same style as Ven. Anne Catherine Emmerich and Ven. Mary of Agreda, this work brings a level of detail and intimacy not found in the former's writings. Although it reads as a novel, it is regarded by many as one of the greatest "commentaries" on Scripture in history, expounding upon many areas of the New Testament that has, at present, remained unexplored or obscure. Most strikingly, it reveals the personalities of Jesus and His Apostles in awe-inspiring detail, and leaves the reader with a greater sense of love and closeness to the second Person of the Holy Trinity. In point of fact, this book moved Mother Teresa so much that she carried with her for spiritual reading, and recommended it, on numerous occasions, to those who asked about it. And when the children of Medjugorje asked Mary what She thought of the book, She said it was the "truth" and to "read it if a person wants to know Jesus." Despite its controversial history with certain Vatican officials, in the final analysis, the verbal approval by pope Pius XII is more than sufficient for Catholics to read it in good conscience. For those who desire to know Jesus Christ in a more intimate

The Art of Poetry

This early work by the great Welsh poet Edward Thomas was originally published in the early 20th century and contains a collection of his poems. Philip Edward Thomas was born in Lambeth, London, England in 1878. His parents were Welsh migrants, and Thomas attended several schools, before ending up at St. Pauls. Thomas led a reclusive early life, and began writing as a teenager. He published his first book, *The Woodland Life* (1897), at the age of just nineteen. A year later, he won a history scholarship to Lincoln College, Oxford. Despite being less well-known than other World War I poets, Thomas is regarded by many critics as one of the finest.
