### Golden Treasury of Indo-Anglian Poetry: 1828-1965

Jeet Thayil's definitive selection covers 55 years of Indian poetry in English. It is the first anthology to represent not just the major poets of the past half-century - the canonical writers who have dominated Indian poetry and publishing since the 1950s - but also the different kinds of poetry written by an extraordinary range of younger poets who live in many countries as well as in India. It is a groundbreaking global anthology of 70 poets writing in a common language responding to shared traditions, different cultures and contrasting lives in the changing modern world. Thayil's starting-point is Nissim Ezekiel, the first important modern Indian poet after Tagore, who published his first collection in London in 1952. Aiming for "verticality" rather than chronology, Thayil's anthology charts a poetry of astonishing volume and quality. It pays homage to major influences, including Ezekiel, Dom Moraes and Arun Kolatkar, who died within months of each other in 2004. It rediscovers forgotten figures such as Lawrence Bantleman and Gopal Honnalgere, and it serves as an introduction to the poets of the future. The book also shows that many Indian poets were mining the rich vein of 'chutnified' (Salman Rushdie's word) Indian English long before novelists like Rushdie and Upamanyu Chatterjee started using it in their fiction. It explains why Pankaj Mishra and Amit Chaudhuri have said that Indian poetry in English has a longer, more distinguished tradition than Indian fiction in English. The Indian poet now lives and works in New York, New Delhi, London, Itanagar, Bangalore, Berkeley, Goa, Sheffield, Lonavala, Montana, Aarhus, Allahabad, Hongkong, Montreal, Melbourne, Calcutta, Connecticut, Cuttack and various other global corridors. While some may have little in common in terms of culture (a number of the poets have never lived in India), this anthology shows how they are all bound by the intimate histories of a shared English language.

In fact, under the guidance of Sri Aurobindo, several poets like Arjava, Dilip Kumar Roy, Harindranath Chattopadhyaya, KD Sethna (Amal Kiran), Themis and Nirodbaran wrote spiritual/mystical poetry for

a new readership. While some welcomed the avant-garde new voices and the new Muse, others like P Lal and Nissim Ezekiel, in later years, decried such efforts as baneful influences upon the younger generation of poets. [Notably P Lal radically altered his views in his later years and welcomed spiritual and classical poetry in general]The early hostile critique of P Lal regarding spiritual poetry appears to be unfair going by the collection admirably edited by eminent poet-critic Vinayak Krishna Gokak. For, his anthology, aptly called The Golden Treasury of Indo-Anglian Poetry New Delhi: [Sahitya Akademi, first edition 1970: rept. 2006] lists the work of great many poets who composed in the pre-modern style and advocated an alternative modernity, anchored to the spiritual vision of life. Poets like Manmohan Ghose, Sarojini Naidu, M Sanyal, Prithwi Singh Nahar, Lotika Ghose, VK Gokak, Nishikanto all wrote in a variety of ways about life and literature based a vision that was antithetical to the modern-secular world view relying on the primacy of Reason and the empirical view of life. I would like to cite, in this context, a poem by M Sanyal, titled The Music of Earth: Fulfilled is my dream O sustainer supreme! And now do I till my lands; I break the sail, Till and toil, And sow the seed; But thou dost know - Thou alone, O Lord, Thou alone - When the seed is sown, What meed I am destined I am destined to receive in Thy hands! I but toil and till my lands. [From Gokak's Golden Treasury, p. 188] If one thought that the spiritual poetry of the above kind had outlived its life, one would surely be mistaken. For spiritual poetry has continued, despite the dominance of modernist trend in the West and the East. It is in this context that one welcomes the anthology Pravar in Spate by RY Deshpande. Poet Deshpande, professionally a nuclear scientist of distinction, has been drawn strongly to the path of spiritual life environed by Sri Aurobindo and the Mother. He has been writing and publishing spiritual/mystical poetry, over many decades, following the example of leading disciple-poets like Nirodbaran and Amal Kiran. Many of the poems that appear in this collection had appeared in print and some others in his blog. Happily, most are being brought together in one volume. These compositions follow the rhyme scheme.

IN OUR TRANSLATED WORLD brings together, for the first time, in bilingual format, a translation of poems written in Tamil, from around the world where Tamils, over a period of several decades, have settled. The poems were written over the last three decades, and since modernity shapes contemporary perspectives in important ways, the struggle between modernity and tradition looms large in this poetry. The transition from an oppressive plantation culture to urban spaces involves numerous concerns, and they find expression in the poetry of Malaysians and Singaporeans. In Tamil Nadu physical dislocation from, say, the rural to the urban, is not seen as traumatic. More problematic, however, is the force of tradition that refuses to change with the times. For Sri Lankans, the frame is political upheaval and its consequent social and cultural disintegration. The poets who chose to live in Sri Lanka and those who moved to the West might point to different perspectives, but both are conscious of dramatic changes in their social and cultural worlds. Taken together, these poems offer an exciting and insightful representation of contemporary global Tamil experience.
