And I'M Sure You'Re Familiar with All these Pictures of Nerve Endings and Neurotransmitters Crossing the Nerve Endings They'Ve Also Been the Suggestions that It's To Do with Abnormal Certain Neural Circuitry the Connections between the Different Parts of the Brain and this Idea Is What I'Ve Called the Disease Centered Model of Drug Action the Idea that Drugs Are Correcting an Underlying Abnormal Brain State It's a It's a Model That We'Ve Borrowed from General Medicine Where Most Medicines Can Be Understood To Work in that Way

And this Is because the Drugs That We Prescribe for Mental Health Problems Are What We Might Call Psychoactive Drugs That Means They'Re Drugs That Pass the Blood-Brain Barrier and Go into the Brain and Change the Brain and by Changing the Brain They Change the Way That People Think and Behave and and People's Emotional Responses As Well and What this Model Is Suggesting Is that the Effects That We See When People Take some Psychiatric Drugs whether We Deem Them To Be Useful or Not Useful Are a Consequence of these Alterations these Alterations to Normal Brain Processes

But of Course They Don't Just Affect the Brain They Affect the Body As Well so There Are Physical and Bodily Alterations That Are Associated with the Mental Alteration So if You Think of for Example the Sedation That Might Be Caused by a Drug like Valium for Example There Is both a Mental and a

Physical Component to that Effect and We Are Used to Thinking of the Term Psychoactive Drugs in Association with Drugs That Are Used for Recreational Purposes so Drugs That Make People Feel Good Feel High Feel Nice Sometimes It's They're Said To Cause Euphoria Of Course That Doesn't Necessarily Mean that They're Working in a Disease Centered Way because the People Who the Psychiatrist Who Used these Drugs Early On in France for Example They Felt that the Alterations That Antipsychotics Produced Were Producing Were More Effective than the Sort of Alterations Produced by Barbiturates but Actually They Don't Look To Be That Different from Other Sorts of Sedatives in the Studies That Have Been Done so There Was a Comparison with Opium Which Showed that Chlorpromazine the Earliest Antipsychotic Was Roughly Equal to the Effects of Opium for People with Acute Psychosis and There's Been Several Studies Looking at Comparing Antipsychotics with Benzodiazepines

So if We Think about Using a Drug Centered Model To Understand How Drugs Are Working in Mental Health Problems What Does that Actually Mean How Does that Mean They Might Be Working so the First Possibility Is that There Is an Interaction between the Alterations That the Drugs Are Producing and the Symptoms That People Are Having the Difficulties People Are Having with Their Behaviors or Thoughts or Emotions but the Other Thing That I Think We Need To Keep in Mind Is that There Are of Course Placebo Effects People Often Feel Hopeful When They're Offered a Drug and That Can Help Them Feel Better in Itself and if They Get a Drug That Produces a Few Side Effects The Trouble with these Naturalistic Follow-Ups Is that that Might Be At Least Partly due to the Fact that the People Who Avoid Long-Term Medication Maybe Have the Less Severe Conditions and the People Who End Up on It Have the More Severe Conditions so We Really Need some Randomized Control Trials with Proper Long-Term Follow-Up To Work Out whether Long-Term Treatment Is a Good Thing or Not and There's One of these That's Been Done in the Netherlands It Was Done with People Who Had Just Had One Episode of a Psychotic Disorder

And some in some of Them Show some Increased Anxiety Agitation over Activity those May Be Long-Term Effects of the Drug Well They May Be Effects of Drug Withdrawal It's Not It's Not Really Clear but Though but It Suggests that Definitely Are some Alterations Going on When You Give Animals and Humans these Drugs and They Also Are Consistent with How People Describe the Altered State that these Drugs Produced Now this this Was a Study I Did Looking at People's Descriptions of Taking Ssrri I Should Say that the Effects of Ssrri Type Antidepressants Are Very Much Less Marked than the Effects of Taking an Antipsychotic

You Would Know It Immediately or As Soon as the Drug Gets into Your System so They're Much Weaker Drugs in Terms of Their Psychoactive Effect but Nevertheless They Do Cause some Alterations and Quite Subtle Alterations and these Includes the Feelings of Listlessness Feelings of a Gay Sort of Emotional Blankness Disengagement Restriction of some Sort and these Effects Seem To Be Associated with a Loss of Libido Which Is Very It's Very Well Recognized that They Called Sexual Impairment in a Smaller Group of People Mostly Younger People They Also Seem To Produce a State of Agitation and Increased Tension
