Fanny Hill is a poor country girl who is forced by poverty to leave her village home and go to London. Tricked into working in a brothel, she witnesses many sexual encounters that awaken a lust in her. After several months of living together, Charles is sent out of the country unexpectedly by his father, and Fanny is forced to take up a succession of new lovers to survive and must then work to regain her respectability.

Life of Fanny Hill

Fanny Hill is a young, poorly-educated girl who lives near Liverpool. After her parent's death, a friend convinces the girl to move to London but soon disappears. Fanny is hired as a maid by Mrs. Brown, a woman she believes to be a wealthy lady but turns out to be a brothel madam. When Fanny first arrives to the brothel, she is immediately introduced to Phoebe. They shared a bed the first night, and Phoebe begins to introduce her to mutual masturbation, where Fanny experiences her first orgasm. This is when Fanny begins to be interested in her pleasure. Little to Fanny's original knowledge, Mrs. Brown planned to use her as a prostitute. Her virtue is very important to her, and she does not want to give it away to just anybody. When Fanny meets a man that is willing to pay a lot of money for her virtue, Fanny finds him repulsive and fights him off. Fanny falls ill for several days, and Mrs. Brown decides to sell Fanny's sexual favors to another wealthy gentleman. During a party, that is normally held for men to find a prostitute, Fanny spies on Mrs. Brown pleasuring a gentleman. This begins her interest in having sex with a man. Soon afterward, the girl meets a young nobleman, Charles, who helps Fanny escape the brothel and takes her to his flat. They became lovers, and for many months they meet almost daily to have sex, while Fanny tries to improve her manners. After eight months, Fanny becomes pregnant, and Charles wants to bring her to meet his father. Upon meeting him, Fanny discovers that Charles's father was the man that had originally paid a large sum to take her virginity, who she had fought off. Charles mysteriously disappears: he has been sent by his father to the South Seas to win a fortune. Fanny miscarries and falls ill; she is nursed back to health by the landlady Mrs. Jones. Mrs. Jones eventually employs Fanny as a prostitute, and introduces her to the wealthy Mr. H. Fanny becomes his mistress, although she was not interested at first because of the thought of Charles. Days go by and Charles does not come home, so Fanny realizes sex could be done just for pleasure and not love. Out of jealousy, she seduces Mr. H's servant, gets caught and loses the man's support. Fanny is taken in by Mrs. Cole,

who runs a brothel in Covent Garden, and meets three other prostitutes (Emily, Harriet, Louisa), who briefly outline their backgrounds. The girls engage in many sexual relationships with men of all types—those who are impotent, masochists, perverts and so on. Fanny also meets a bisexual young man and is startled by her first encounter with male homosexuality. In a tavern, she surprises two young men engaging in anal sex in the next room and faints. Later, she rouses the villagers to try to hunt the two men down and punish them. Fanny's colleagues follow different paths: Louisa seduces a brutal teenager and leaves Mrs. Cole's brothel because of his affair with another young man. Emily, invited with Fanny to a country estate, is rescued by her parents who, unaware of her career as a prostitute, want her to come home again. She accepts. Mrs. Cole retires, and Fanny starts living off her savings. She meets a man who falls in love with her but treats her like his daughter. He dies and leaves his small fortune to her. Therefore, Fanny is now able to try to locate Charles, who disappeared in the South Seas. Several months later, she runs into Charles in a tavern: he had been shipwrecked on the coast while coming back to England. The couple make love several times and, despite Fanny's confessions about her life of vices, Charles forgives her and asks the girl to marry him. She complies heartily.

Esther Davis, a girl from Fanny's village who has since moved to London, convinces Fanny to move to the city as well, but Esther inexplicably abandons Fanny once they arrive. Fanny meets Mrs. Brown, a short, obese, rich woman who gives Fanny lodging. Unfortunately Mrs. Brown runs a brothel and Fanny is forced to spend an evening with an elderly, impotent, obese man.

Following the death of her parents, a young and innocent Fanny Hill travels to London to find work. She has barely arrived, however, when she is lured into a brothel and has a sexual experience with another woman. A costumer gets her out of there and becomes her lover, but a whole new world has opened to Fanny, who sets out to explore all the pleasures her body has in store for her. Considered the first prose pornography '*Fanny Hill - Memoirs of a Woman of Pleasure*' (1748) is one of the most prosecuted and banned books of all time. It has often been quoted in popular culture, in Tom Lehrer's song "Smut" and in an episode of '*Monty Python's Flying Circus*' to name a couple. LUST Classics is a collection of erotic literary classics. Although some of their content can appear controversial, these titles

have been selected due to their historical importance within the field of erotic literature. John Cleland (1709-1789) was an English writer, most famous for the erotic novel 'Fanny Hill: or, the Memoirs of a Woman of Pleasure', which got him and his publisher arrested. For a hundred years, the novel could only be purchased illegally.

Memoirs of Fanny Hill

The novel consists of two long letters (which appear as volumes I and II of the original edition) by Frances "Fanny" Hill, a rich Englishwoman in her middle age, who leads a life of contentment with her loving husband Charles and their children, from Fanny to an unnamed acquaintance, identified only as 'Madam.' Fanny has been prevailed upon by 'Madam' to recount the 'scandalous stages' of her earlier life, which she proceeds to do with 'stark naked truth' as her governing principle. The first letter begins with a short account of Fanny's impoverished childhood in a village in Lancashire. At age 14 she loses her parents to smallpox, arrives in London to look for domestic work, and gets lured into a brothel. She sees a sexual encounter between an ugly older couple and another between a young attractive couple, and participates in a lesbian encounter with Phoebe, a bisexual prostitute. A customer, Charles, induces Fanny to escape. She loses her virginity to Charles and becomes his lover. Charles is sent away by deception to the South Seas, and Fanny is driven by desperation and poverty to become the kept woman of a rich merchant named Mr H-. After enjoying a brief period of stability, she sees Mr H- have a sexual encounter with her own maid, and goes on to seduce Will (the young footman of Mr H-) as an act of revenge. She is discovered by Mr H- as she is having a sexual encounter with Will. After being abandoned by Mr H-, Fanny becomes a prostitute for wealthy clients in a pleasure-house run by Mrs Cole. This marks the end of the first letter. John Cleland (baptised September 24, 1709 - January 23, 1789) was an English novelist most famous and infamous as the author of Fanny Hill: or, the Memoirs of a Woman of Pleasure. John Cleland was the oldest son of William Cleland (1673/4 - 1741) and Lucy Cleland. He was born in Kingston upon Thames in Surrey but grew up in London, where his father was first an officer in the British Army and then a civil servant. William Cleland was a friend to Alexander Pope, and Lucy Cleland was a friend or acquaintance of both Pope, Viscount Bolingbroke, Chesterfield, and Horace Walpole. The family possessed good finances and moved among the finest literary and artistic circles of London. John Cleland entered Westminster School in 1721, but he left or was expelled in 1723. His departure was not for financial reasons, but whatever misbehavior or allegation had led to his departure is unknown. Historian J. H. Plumb speculates that Cleland's puckish and quarrelsome nature was to blame, but, whatever caused Cleland to leave, he entered the British East India Company after leaving school. He began as a soldier and worked his way up into the civil service of the company and lived in Bombay from 1728 to 1740. He returned to London when recalled by his father, who was dying. Upon William's death, the estate went to Lucy for administration. She, in turn, did not choose to support John (and Cleland's two brothers had finished at Westminster and gone on to support themselves).

Memoirs of a Woman of Pleasure has become popularly known as Fanny Hill. It was written in 1748, while John Cleland was in debtors' prison in London. The book is written in the first person, in the form of two Letters, and describes a young woman's sexual exploits from loss of virginity through enthusiastic participation in explicit detail. It is considered the original English prose erotic novel. The book was published in two installments, presumably the first Letter followed by the second. The British government did not react until a year after the first installment was published, and then charged the author and publisher with "corrupting the King's subjects." In court, the author renounced the novel and it was withdrawn from publication. In 1821, an edition of Fanny Hill published in England was officially banned in the United States by the Massachusetts Supreme Court. It was not officially published in the U.S. until 1963, and was immediately again banned in Massachusetts. In 1963, however, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the book did not meet obscenity standards.
