A boyfriend leaves his great love to marry a "more appropriate" good girl. Sahar navigates her way through so many relationships, ill-prepared by her parents and unhappy childhood home. Her imagination is what allows her to act out all of the desires she has been denied throughout her whole life, from her childhood to her abusive marriage. But she also finds solace in her best friend, Hala, who has faced her own difficult childhood and adolescence and later a series of destructive relationships. At the same time that this novel is able to capture the intensity of emotions and experiences in women's lives, it is not merely a story about the power of imagination to enrich the lives of oppressed women. Elhassan's novel is a stark appraisal of how far women are pushed and the length to which women will go to escape a reality that is rotten at the core.

El argentino Raúl Argemí, que se consolidó en el género desde que se asentó en Barcelona, es uno de los novelistas más originales en el actual entorno de la novela negra en cualquier idioma que esta se escriba; el español Juan Ramón Biedma va rompiendo con cada una de sus novelas los límites entre los géneros, a partir esencialmente de una profunda admiración por la literatura gótica; el puertorriqueño Elidio La Torre Lagares, con apenas dos novelas puramente negras, se ha convertido en un referente de la nueva novela negra caribeña; el español Andreu Martín, autor de una vastísima obra es la prueba más viva de cómo un clásico puede renovarse en cada nueva entrega, sin perder la fuerza y el encanto de sus primeros tiempos; el guatemalteco Francisco Alejandro Méndez, pionero del género en Centroamérica, ha ganado su espacio a partir de historias asentadas en la terrible realidad marginal en la que parece estar hundido todo su país; el colombiano Nahum Montt ha ofrecido sobre el tema emblemático de Colombia, el narcotráfi co, una nueva mirada tan humanista que su voz se ubica con apenas dos novelas entre lo mejor de la novela negra latinoamericana actual; el español José Luis Muñoz es el autor que mejor demuestra en sus libros su tesis personal sobre la internacionalización de la criminalidad como modus vivendi de la especie humana; el bonaerense Guillermo Orsi se ha ido imponiendo a fuerza de premios con una de las miradas críticas más profundas al vínculo entre corrupción socio-política e historia nacional en su Argentina natal; la mexicana Cristina Rivera Garza es una mención obligada a la hora de estudiar la llamada literatura "de la frontera Norte", una de las zonas "negras" más interesantes y complejas de la actualidad en México; el argentino Carlos Salem, desde su cuartel general en Madrid, tiene en opinión de la crítica española el mérito de ser el novelista del género que más lo ha roto y renovado, desde dentro, en sus tres últimas novelas; la cubana Karla Suárez, que ha escrito muchos cuentos "negros" y una sola (su más reciente) novela dentro del género, es una de las narradoras de la isla con mayor reconocimiento internacional; el cubano Justo Vasco, ya desde mucho antes de su temprana muerte en el 2006, había inscrito su nombre en el listado de nombres imprescindibles en la historia de la novela negra en Cuba y América Latina; y el ecuatoriano Javier Vásconez, que confiesa haber escrito novelas negras sin proponérselo, es autor de al menos cuatro títulos de obligatoria mención en cualquier estudio serio sobre este tema en lengua española. It is well known that Jorge Luis Borges was a translator, but this has been considered a curious minor aspect of his literary achievement. Few have been aware of the number of texts he translated, the importance he attached to this activity, or the extent to which the translated works inform his own stories and poems. Between the age of ten, when he translated Oscar Wilde, and the end of his life, when he prepared a Spanish version of the Prose Edda, Borges transformed the work of Poe, Kafka, Hesse, Kipling, Melville, Gide, Faulkner, Whitman, Woolf, Chesterton, and many others. In a multitude of essays, lectures, and interviews Borges analyzed the versions of others and developed an engaging view about translation. He held that a translation can improve an original, that contradictory renderings of the same work can be equally valid, and that an original can be unfaithful to a translation. Borges's bold habits as translator and his views on translation had a decisive impact on his creative process. Translation is also a recurrent motif in Borges's stories. In "The Immortal," for example, a character who has lived for many centuries regains knowledge of poems he had authored, and almost forgotten, by way of modern translations. Many of Borges's fictions include actual or imagined translations, and some of his most important characters are translators. In "Pierre Menard, author of the Quixote," Borges's character is a respected Symbolist poet, but also a translator, and the narrator insists that Menard's masterpiece-his "invisible work"-adds unsuspected layers of meaning to Cervantes's Don Quixote. George Steiner cites this short story as "the most acute, most concentrated commentary anyone has offered on the business of translation." In an age where many discussions of translation revolve around the dichotomy faithful/unfaithful, this book will surprise and delight even Borges's closest readers and critics.

The Inner Structure of Tai Chi

Jorge Luis Borges declared The Invention of Morel a masterpiece of plotting, comparable to The Turn of the Screw and Journey to the Center of the Earth. Set on a mysterious island, Bioy's novella is a story of suspense and exploration, as well as a wonderfully unlikely romance, in which every detail is at once crystal clear and deeply mysterious. Inspired by Bioy Casares's fascination with the movie star Louise Brooks, The Invention of Morel has gone on to live a secret life of its own. Greatly admired by Julio Cortázar, Gabriel García Márquez, and Octavio Paz, the novella helped to usher in Latin American fiction's now famous postwar boom. As the model for Alain Resnais and Alain Robbe-Grillet's Last Year in Marienbad, it also changed the history of film.
