This book provides an overview of computer techniques and tools — especially from artificial intelligence (AI) — for handling legal evidence, police intelligence, crime analysis or detection, and forensic testing, with a sustained discussion of methods for the modelling of reasoning and forming an opinion about the evidence, methods for the modelling of argumentation, and computational approaches to dealing with legal, or any, narratives. By the 2000s, the modelling of reasoning on legal evidence has emerged as a significant area within the well-established field of AI & Law. So are areas in the forensic sciences. Special chapters are devoted to *VIRTOPSY* (a procedure for legal medicine) and *FLINTS* (a tool for the police). This is both an introductory book (possibly a textbook), and a reference for specialists from various quarters.
