From Assimilation to Group Survival

In Christians and Jews Together, Stuart Dauermann challenges Christians and Jews to discover new ways to partner together in serving what God is up to in the world. Ê He imaginatively connects the thinking of Paul the Apostle with the Prophet Ezekiel, forming a previously unexplored bridge between Jews and Christians. This is an excellent resource for Christians seeking new ways to understand and share their faith within the context of deep respect for their Jewish neighbors, relatives, and friends.

The Jewish Quarterly Review

Ch. 11 (pp. 281-315), "Public Relations 1978-1995," discusses the New South Wales Jewish Board of Deputies' monitoring of the local media (including Arabic newspapers) and its reactions to antisemitism and anti-Zionism. It also monitored extremist organizations, both right and left, and encouraged the passing of anti-racist (including anti-antisemitic) legislation. In 1995 the Federal Racial Hatred Act was passed, but the Jewish community was not satisfied with its watered-down provisions. Ch. 12 (pp. 317-343), "Remembering the Holocaust 1978-1995," discusses the Holocaust commemoration activities sponsored by the Jewish community, among them the Holocaust Remembrance Committee, Yom Hashoah and Holocaust Awareness Week, the Australian Association of Jewish Holocaust Survivors, an oral testimony project, Holocaust teaching kits, an educational link to Yad Vashem, the Australian Institute for Holocaust Studies, and the Sydney Jewish Museum, which is largely devoted to the Holocaust and has had an impact on Australian non-Jews as well as Jews.

The Great Synagogue

Pentecostal religion is the fastest-growing religion in Australia, recording a huge growth at a time when more traditional Christian congregations are shrinking. This book explores the rise of the religious right in Australia and in particular the influence of the Assemblies of God.

The Christian Effect on Jewish Life

This is a anthropoligical and sociological study of a Jewish boys school in Melbourne undertaken over a period of 15 months. The research centres on the issues facing the teaching staff as well as student perspectives of life at the school.

Inclusive Judaism

Discusses the philosophy of Judaism, the role of reason, Jewish election, the personality of God, ethics, and the messianic aspects of Judaism

Defending Christian Zionism

This study is largely based on 93 interviews conducted in the 1990s with current or ex-New Zealand Jews of widely differing backgrounds. Ch. 5 (pp. 85-99) discusses antisemitism (as do pp. 15-18, 28-30 in ch. 1). Jews in New Zealand (who in 1991 numbered 3,048 or 0.1% of the total population) generally have kept a low profile. Most of the interviewees view present-day antisemitism as slight, despite some anti-Jewish Christian attitudes. Four types of antisemitism are noted: ignorant, petty (e.g. jokes), political (including anti-Zionist and anti-Israel), and malicious (including vandalism and Holocaust denial). Local Jews have been cautious in responding to antisemitism, though there has been some effort to speak out. While the identities of survivors and their descendants have been

strongly affected by the Holocaust, those of other new Zealand Jews have not. Commemoration of the Holocaust has been much more modest than in Australia or in Israel. Some Jews continue to feel that "it' could happen again, even in New Zealand".
