In particular, Hume argues, monotheistic religions tend to be more intolerant and hypocritical, result in greater intellectual absurdities, and foster socially undesirable "monkish virtues," such as mortification, abasement, and passive suffering.

David Hume is one of the most provocative philosophers to have written in English. His Dialogues ask if a belief in God can be inferred from what is known of the universe, or whether such a belief is even consistent with such knowledge. The Natural History of Religion investigates the origins of belief, and follows its development from polytheism to dogmatic monotheism. Together, these works constitute the most formidable attack upon religious belief ever mounted by a philosopher. This new edition includes Section XI of The Enquiry Concerning Human Understanding and a letter by Hume in which he discusses Dialogues.

# The Natural History of Religion

David Hume was a highly original thinker. Nevertheless, he was a writer of his time and place in the history of philosophy. In this book, M. A. Stewart puts Hume's writing in context, particularly that of his native Scotland, but also that of British and European philosophy more generally. Through meticulous research Stewart brings to life the circumstances by means of which we can get a deeper understanding of Hume's writings on the nature and reach of human reason, the foundation of morals, and, especially, on the philosophy of religion. Stewart pays particular attention to Hume's intellectual development, beginning with his education at the College of Edinburgh, the writing of his Treatise of Human Nature, and his subsequent philosophical responses to criticisms of that book. He argues that Hume's scepticism set him at odds with the Christian Stoicism of Scottish contemporaries including that of Francis Hutcheson - and shows that this conflict played a major role in his failure to obtain the Edinburgh Moral Philosophy Chair in 1745. Stewart's detailed study of the physical character of Hume's surviving manuscripts in Chapters 8 and 9 provides the best available dating of his early 'Essay on Modern Chivalry', his 'Early Fragment on Evil' and the periods of composition of his Dialogues Concerning Natural Religion. Other chapters compare Hume's theory of abstraction with that of Locke and Berkeley, provide the 17th and 18th century philosophical context of the central argument of his essay 'Of miracles', and consider the 18th and 19th century reception of his writings in England and Ireland.

Im Vergleich zum Treatise wurden diese Essays häufiger gelesen und hatten einen größeren Erfolg. 1748 schrieb er daher das erste Buch des Treatise um, fügte einige Abhandlungen hinzu und nannte es Enquiry Concerning Human Understanding. Seine History of England veröffentlichte er 1754 bis 1762, "in an age when the political battles of the present were habitually fought through the past, Hume judged correctly that history – English history – was the most effective medium for his political views." Viele weitere politische, moralische, religiöse und philosophische Texte verfasste Hume im Laufe seines Lebens, doch da ich meines Erachtens die wichtigsten genannt habe, möchte ich an dieser Stelle keine weiteren mehr anführen. "In 1776, at age 65, he died from an internal disorder which had plagued him for many months." Ich befasse mich im Folgenden speziell mit David Humes politischen Essays. Ich werde zunächst den Essay "Über Parteien im allgemeinen", anschließend den "Über die Parteien in Großbritannien" und zum Abschluss den "Über die Parteienkoalition" behandeln. Hume wählte als literarische Gattung die Essays. Der Essay ist eine ganz spezielle Form zum Verfassen von Gedankengängen.
