Piracy is an act of robbery or criminal violence at sea. Those who engage in acts of piracy are called pirates. The era of piracy in the Caribbean began in the 1500s and died out in the 1830s after the navies of the nations of Western Europe and North America with colonies in the Caribbean began combating pirates. In the early eighteenth century a number of the great pirate captains, including Edward 'Blackbeard' Teach and 'Black Sam' Bellamy, joined forces. This infamous 'Pirating Gang' was more than simply a thieving band of brothers. Many of its members had come to piracy as a revolt against conditions in the merchant fleet and in the cities and plantations in the Old and New Worlds. Piracy flourished in the Caribbean because of the existence of pirate seaports such as Port Royal in Jamaica, Tortuga in Haiti, and Nassau in the Bahamas. Inspired by notions of self-government, they established a crude but distinctive form of democracy in the Bahamas, carving out their own zone of freedom in which indentured servants were released and leaders chosen or deposed by a vote. Pirates

The earthquake hit Port Royal, Jamaica 7 June 1692. A pocket watch found frozen in time recovered by a diver in 1969 indicated that the event occurred at precisely 11:43 a.m. A second quake followed with a tsunami that caused over 2,000 to perish and much of the "Wickedest City of all Places on Earth" to disappear below the surface of the sea. Twenty-eight years later-1720-Bartholomew "Black Bart" Roberts, no doubt under some alias, fetched up in Port Royal in time to witness the hanging of 'Calico' Jack Rackham out on Gallows Point. Born John Roberts in 1682, he was the most successful pirate of the 'Golden Age of Piracy.' Why was he there? How long did he stay? Did he leave anything behind? Miraculously, what is left of Port Royal remains today on the far western end of a long sandy peninsula of palm trees and mangroves, barely eking out an existence. Many of the simple folk remaining are in some manner related to pirates, freebooters and privateers of yore who once gave Port Royal such a sinful and wicked reputation. Some 300 years after the earthquake-1997-Marine Pilot and Master ship handler, Captain Bruce Fisher, received a message in a sealed envelope, the note read: "Captain, please contact ASAP. We would like to send you to Jamaica if you can be available." The assignment was to bring 80,000-ton Panamax bulk carriers into a long-abandoned site of the former Royal Navy

Coaling Station. There was no navigable channel, no charts, no dock, no one even knew the depth of water. Thus began a modern-day adventure requiring masterful skills of seamanship. Navigating through a narrow channel over a sunken city with only inches to spare, little did Captain Fisher know that what lay beneath held mysteries from the past and with untold intrigue and danger that would come to pass.

Pirates

Built on sugar, slaves, and piracy, Jamaica's Port Royal was the jewel in England's quest for Empire until a devastating earthquake sank the city beneath the sea. A haven for pirates and the center of the New World's frenzied trade in slaves and sugar, Port Royal, Jamaica, was a notorious cutthroat settlement where enormous fortunes were gained for the fledgling English empire. But on June 7, 1692, it all came to a catastrophic end. Drawing on research carried out in Europe, the Caribbean, and the United States, *Apocalypse 1692: Empire, Slavery, and the Great Port Royal Earthquake* by Ben Hughes opens in a post-Glorious Revolution London where two Jamaica-bound voyages are due to depart. A seventy-strong fleet will escort the Earl of Inchiquin, the newly appointed governor, to his residence at Port Royal, while the *Hannah*, a slaver belonging to the Royal African Company, will sail south to pick up human cargo in West Africa before setting out across the Atlantic on the infamous Middle Passage. Utilizing little-known first-hand accounts and other primary sources, *Apocalypse 1692* intertwines several related themes: the slave rebellion that led to the establishment of the first permanent free black communities in the New World; the raids launched between English Jamaica and Spanish Santo Domingo; and the bloody repulse of a full-blown French invasion of the island in an attempt to drive the English from the Caribbean. The book also features the most comprehensive account yet written of the massive earthquake and tsunami which struck Jamaica in 1692, resulting in the deaths of thousands, and sank a third of the city beneath the sea. From the misery of everyday life in the sugar plantations, to the ostentation and double-dealings of the plantocracy; from the adventures of former-pirates-turned-treasure-hunters to the debauchery of Port Royal, *Apocalypse 1692* exposes the lives of the individuals who made late seventeenth-century Jamaica the most financially successful, brutal, and scandalously corrupt of all of England's nascent American colonies.
