## Cracking the Egyptian Code

The Rosetta Stone, uncovered in 1799 by Napoleon's army, recorded its inscription in three scripts - ancient Greek, Coptic, and hieroglyphic. It would provide scholars with the first clues to unlocking the secrets of Egyptian hieroglyphs, a language lost for nearly two millennia. More than twenty years later a remarkably gifted Frenchman, Jean-Francois Champollion successfully deciphered the hieroglyphs sparking a revolution in our knowledge of ancient Egypt. 'Cracking the Egyptian Code' is the first biography in English of Champollion, widely regarded as the founder of Egyptology. Andrew Robinson meticulously reconstructs how Champollion cracked the code of the hieroglyphic script, describing how Champollion started with Egyptian obelisks in Rome and papyri in European collections, sailed the Nile for a year, studied the tombs in the Valley of the Kings (a name he first coined), and carefully compared the three scripts on the Rosetta Stone to penetrate the mystery of the hieroglyphic text. Robinson also brings to life the rivalry between Champollion and the English scientist Thomas Young, who claimed credit for launching the decipherment, which Champollion hotly denied. There is much more to Champollion's life than the Rosetta Stone and Robinson gives equal weight to the many roles he played in his tragically brief life, from a teenage professor in Revolutionary France to a supporter

of Napoleon (whom he met), an exile, and a curator at the Louvre. Extensively illustrated, 'Cracking the Egyptian Code' will appeal to anyone interested in Egypt, decipherment and code-breaking, and Napoleon and the French Revolution.

# **Cracking Codes**

Napoleon's troops discovered a granitoid slab in the village of Rosetta in the western Delta in 1799. The Rosetta Stone was to become one of the most famous Egyptian antiquities in the world as well as an instantly recognizable icon of script and decipherment. In this exciting, beautifully illustrated work, Richard Parkinson tells the story of the Stone's discovery and the so-called battle of the decipherers that it inspired. Published to accompany a major exhibition at the British Museum celebrating the bicentenary of the Stone's discovery, and including a selective catalog of the exhibits, this book also examines the wider issues of script and writing in ancient Egypt and beyond. The Rosetta Stone is a fragment of a stela inscribed with a priestly decree in honor of Ptolemy V. The main significance of the text lies not in its content, however, but in the fact that it is written in three scripts--hieroglyphic, demotic, and ancient Greek. Early Orientalists recognized immediately the potential of the Stone for the decipherment of Egyptian hieroglyphs. Thomas Young made great advances, especially with the demotic text, but it was Jean-Franýois Champollion who made the final breakthrough in 1822. In so doing he cracked much more than two Egyptian scripts: He opened up Egyptian culture as a whole to historians. Among the subjects discussed in Cracking Codes are the relationship between hieroglyphs and art, the social prestige of literacy, and the power of writing and its practical aspects (scribal equipment and training). The other meanings are 'a lord, master, protector, leader, God, husband. This hieroglyph was used mostly for 'the lightning god'. (M22) Phonetic is 'nichb' means 'sedge, reed'. Neither the hieroglyph is showing sedge or a reed. Actually, the pictograph was sketched to show the furrow in a field. The two side arms, which are declared 'a set of leaves' by European Egyptologists, these arm type lines are not leaves but showing the ridges like letter V between a furrows. The upper turn shows to come back for next furrow. Based on Sanskrit, the word is sh-mb-h 6MMich means 'Lightning: ploughing of a field and makes furrow, track or line as the lightning uses to plough the clouds. Other meanings are 'To go, move, happy, fortunate'. Alan Gardiner declared this hieroglyph logogram U1 as a 'sickle' without knowing the Egyptian culture. Though, his searching of phonetic sound of first letter of the word 'ma' was correct. Next diphthong ng was forgotten by Copts. Alas! Egyptologists would have searched the ancient boats of Egypt. The Egyptian hieroglyph Gardiner sign listed no.U1 is a Sanskrit based Egyptian word m-ng .(Mhich means 'the head or front of a boat'. (E26) Transliteration '3b, 3bu, eb' by European Egyptologist is not correct. Only Sanskrit has its correct word e-bh-h which means 'an elephant as well as cloud'. The other synonyms for an elephant are 'g-j ]h-sti 960 M/S @.Sku-mbhi AmMd-@.J.g-je-ndr k@(M/&Mbbw0-p &\data-?† 5>0#sh 0006s.hieroglyph of an elephant could be used for all synonyms words which mean 'an elephant as well as cloud. 'Opening of the mouth' ceremony or ritual --- (F- 13) phonetic is 'wp, jp' means 'horn'. But the real Sanskrit's word is shri-nga 6M/000(M)eans 'the horn'. (D-21) phonetic is 'r, rr, p (kh) ar' means 'mouth'. But true word of Sanskrit is r-nh 0/M/9h means 'talketive, speaking. Often the first letter r of this hieroglyph has used in Egyptian texts. Egyptologists have misinterpreted the above hieroglyphic description as 'opening of the mouth'. The Sanskrit complete word of Shri-nga @WIEC3Mand first letter r of D21 (r-nh) is taken. Thus the complete conjunctive word is Shri-nga+r 6M/1000 (Indeeth) 'A fragrant for dress or body, to make up, adornment of body'. This refinement by makeup of mummy (shabti) was ritual. The term Shri-nga-r (makeup) is for both the living and the dead person. Guessing to see the open horns means 'opening of the mouth ceremony' is wild guess. Not only this, the key
