The Secret Garden is written by American author Frances Hodgson Burnett and published in book form in 1911. The novel revolves on Mary Lennox, a selfish and disagreeable 10-year-old girl, who is living in India with her wealthy British family. Neglected by her parents, Mary is spoiled by her servants. Mary is orphaned when a cholera epidemic kills her parents and the servants. After staying briefly with an English clergyman, she is sent to England to live with a widowed uncle, his huge Yorkshire estate, but he is rarely there. Consequently, she is brought to the estate by the head housekeeper who shuts her into a room and tells her not to explore the house. Later on, her interaction with nature transforms her and she becomes kinder and more considerate. The Secret Garden is a tale of transformation and feeling of extreme happiness in the presence of nature. The physical and spiritual healing that Mary experiences in the garden is mirrored in the nature's seasons.

Isabel and Julian Bannerman have been described as "mavericks in the grand manner, touched by genius" (Min Hogg, World of Interiors) and "the Bonnie and Clyde of garden design" (Ruth Guilding, The Bible of British Taste). Their approach to design, while rooted in history and the classical tradition, is fresh, eclectic and surprising. From the myth of Arcadia through to the twenty-first century, ideas about sustainability - how we imagine better urban environments – remain persistently relevant, and raise recurring questions. How do cities evolve as complex spaces nurturing both urban creativity and the fortuitous art of discovery, and by which mechanisms do they foster imagination and innovation? While past utopias were conceived in terms of an ideal geometry, contemporary exemplary models of urban design seek technological solutions of optimal organisation. The Venice Variations explores Venice as a prototypical city that may hold unique answers to the ancient narrative of utopia. Venice was not the result of a preconceived ideal but the pragmatic outcome of social and economic networks of communication. Through a discussion of Venice and two other works owing their inspiration to this city – Italo Calvino's Invisible Cities and Le Corbusier's Venice Hospital – Sophia Psarra describes Venice as a system that starts to resemble a highly probabilistic 'algorithm', that is, a structure with a small number of rules capable of producing a large number of variations. The rapidly escalating processes of urban development around our big cities share many of the motivations for survival, shelter and trade that brought Venice into existence. Rather than seeing these places as problems to be solved, we need to understand how urban complexity can evolve, as happened from its unprepossessing origins in the marshes of the Venetian lagoon to the 'model city' that endured a thousand years. This book frees Venice from stereotypical representations, revealing its generative capacity to inform potential other 'Venices' for the future.

The Venetian City Garden

The Gardens of Dorset

In the attic of their old family palazzo on the Grand Canal, Andrea di Robilant's father had found the love letters of their ancestor Andrea Memmo, one of the last great Venetian statesmen, to a beautiful half-English girl named Giustiniana Wynne. Some of the letters were written in code, which di Robilant and his father cracked to reveal an illicit passion: Giustiniana was not of the elite ruling class and would never have been considered a suitable match for Andrea. But their acts of devotion were startlingly brazen. As their courtship unfolds, they plot elaborate marriage schemes that offend everyone, arrange secret trysts in borrowed rooms, cause trouble for the servants who must ferry their forbidden correspondence, and even weather an unwanted pregnancy, from which Giustiniana, with her wits and ingenuity and some crucial assistance from the infamous Casanova, emerges unscathed.

Great Gardens of Britain

A History of Gardening in England was published by the antiquarian book dealer and publisher Bernard Quaritch in 1895. The reviews were very positive and picked up its important features. First, its completeness... second, its extensive bibliography...and third, its readability. Alicia Amherst's book laid the foundation for the later study of garden history and defined the parameters for its scholarly methods...her wide education enabled her to map horticultural history alongside social, political and technological developments without special pleading for any particular point of view. That was quite some achievement in an age of the partisan. Alicia Amherst was a distinguished Victorian and Edwardian horticulturist whose seminal book, A History of Gardening in England, was enormously

influential in its time, running to three editions, and can still be enjoyed by today's readers--- if they can find a copy. For this, and her other published works have not been reprinted since the 1930s and are now rather rare. In particular, London Parks and Gardens (1907) and Historic Gardens of England (1938) are important historical records, the first of which has never really been superseded in the comprehensive treatment of its subject. She was the recipient of many honours during her lifetime, but the one which gave her the greatest pleasure was being given the freedom of the Worshipful Company of Gardeners in 1896. This is the first biography of Alicia Amherst and it reveals a woman of remarkable gifts and energy. Not only was she passionate about plants and gardens, being both an observant botanist and a very practical gardener, she was active in politics, becoming prominent in the British Women's Emigration Association and, After world War I, in the Society for the Overseas Settlement of British Women. Coming from a privileged background she was, in every sense, well-connections well, as this volume shows. Sue Minter graduated with a Master of Arts Degree from Girton College, Cambridge, and won a Fulbright Scholarship to the University of California, Berkeley, to study 19th Century American History. She later studied horticulture for the Royal Horticultural Society's exams at Merrist Wood College, Surrey and Pershore College, Worcestershire. Sue has worked at the Royal Botanic Gardens, kew, where she was part of the team responsible for the restoration and replanting of the Palm House. In 1991 she became the first female Curator of the Chelsea Physic Garden, a post she held until 2001, when she was appointed Director of Horticulture at the Eden Project. Her career has taken her on plant-collecting and research trips to many exotic locations. She is a Fellow of the Linnaean Society and current President of the Institute of Horticulture, and has recently been appointed an Ambassador for Diversity in Public Appointments at the Cabinet Office. She lives in Plymouth.

The Austrian playwright, novelist, and poet Thomas Bernhard (1931-89) is acknowledged as among the major writers of our times. At once pessimistic and exhilarating, Bernhard's work depicts the corruption of the modern world, the dynamics of totalitarianism, and the interplay of reality and appearance. In this stunning translation of The Voice Imitator, Bernhard gives us one of his most darkly comic works. A series of parable-like anecdotes—some drawn from newspaper reports, some from conversation, some from hearsay—this satire is both subtle and acerbic. What initially appear to be quaint little stories inevitably indict the sterility and callousness of modern life, not just in urban centers but everywhere. Bernhard presents an ordinary world careening into absurdity and disaster. Politicians, professionals, tourists, civil servants—the usual victims of Bernhard's inspired misanthropy—succumb one after another to madness, mishap, or suicide. The shortest piece, titled "Mail," illustrates the anonymity and alienation that have become standard in contemporary society: "For years after our mother's death, the Post Office still delivered letters that were addressed to her.
