Based on over a decade of extensive archival research, Victory's Shadow deftly reconstructs and evaluates the decisions, outcomes, and costs involved in this experience of territorial integration and considers its implications for ongoing debates regarding the dynamics of expansionism across the diverse boundary zones of medieval Europe.

Bihes: Bibliografias de Historia de Espana

Pour l'historien plus familier du reste de l'Europe médiévale, et particulièrement de la France, qui aborde Tolède et ses campagnes dans la seconde moitié du XVe siècle, le paysage offre peu de traits susceptibles de le dérouter au premier abord. Cependant déjà, à ce premier niveau d'examen, un certain nombre de traits ne peuvent manquer de retenir l'attention et, montrent que, s'il existe de grandes analogies avec les villes et les campagnes de l'Europe moyenne, il n'est pas possible d'appliquer tout uniment ses schémas valables au Nord des Pyrénées, et, surtout, que cette analogie est probablement le résultat d'une évolution toute différente. Fait d'une succession d'exposés denses, l'ouvrage de Jean-Pierre Molénat réunit une masse considérable d'informations sur les structures sociales, économiques et institutionnelles de la cité et de l'influence qu'elles ont exercée sur l'organisation de l'espace rural qu'elle contrôlait. De celui-ci il a minutieusement décrit le retour à la vie, longtemps retardé par les incursions de plus ou moins grande envergure des Almoravides puis des Almohades. Les membres de l'oligarchie urbaine, maîtres du sol, ont visé à reconstituer, sans y parvenir complètement, le réseau des habitats - les garya-s - de l'époque musulmane. Les crises du XVIe siècle ont entraîné un réaménagement de l'espace marqué par l'extension de la seigneurie foncière, la concentration de l'habitat et l'« affirmation » de la communauté villageoise, tandis qu'au sein de l'oligarchie urbaine, grossie d'éléments extérieurs, certains lignages déclinaient alors que d'autres s'intégraient à la haute noblesse du royaume de Castille. Tolède, longtemps cas singulier, ne constitue plus désormais une exception.

In diesem Band werden erstmals zwei europäische Großregionen vergleichend in den Blick genommen, so dass neue Sichtweisen auf Grenzen und ihre spezifischen Ausprägungen eröffnet werden. Die paarweise Anordnung der in diesem Band versammelten Beiträge gewährleistet in besonderer Weise den Vergleich und verdeutlicht Affinitäten wie Unterschiede zweier geographisch weit voneinander entfernter Räume. Denn beide Bereiche, die Iberische Halbinsel und Ostmitteleuropa, waren zwar in sich einzig, doch in vielem strukturell ähnlich. Diese Randzonen Europas eignen sich aus drei Gründen besonders für eine komparatistische Untersuchung der Grenzenräume und Grenzüberschreitungen im vormodernen Europa. Zum einen waren sie stärker noch als andere Bereiche durch multi-religiöse und multi-ethnische Gesellschaften geprägt. Hier verdichten sich grundlegende soziale, religiöse und kulturelle Aspekte europäischer Gemeinschaftsordnungen. Zum anderen stießen hier oftmals mit besonderer Schärfe verschiedenartige Kulturen aufeinander. Schließlich und drittens waren diese

Räume auch in funktionaler Hinsicht außerordentlich vielgestaltig: Sie dienten als Abgrenzungswie auch als Kontakt- und Austauschzonen, als politisch-kulturelle wie auch als kolonisatorische Grenzgebiete, als Militär- und Religionsgrenzen zugleich.

The Quarterly Index Islamicus

This work represents a considerably revised edition of the first comparative history of Islamic and Christian Spain between A.D. 711 and 1250. It focuses on the differential development of agriculture and urbanization in the Islamic and Christian territories and the flow of information and techniques between them.

Campagnes et monts de Tolède du XIIe au XVe siècle

This is the first study in English of the political history of Muslim Spain and Portugal, based on Arab sources. It provides comprehensive coverage of events across the whole of the region from 711 to the fall of Granada in 1492. Up till now the history of this region has been badly neglected in comparison with studies of other states in medieval Europe. When considered at all, it has been largely written from Christian sources and seen in terms of the Christian Reconquest. Hugh Kennedy raises the profile of this important area, bringing the subject alive with vivid translations from Arab sources. This will be fascinating reading for historians of medieval Europe and for historians of the middle east drawing out the similarities and contrasts with other areas of the Muslim world.

Carl Schmitt's magnum opus, Constitutional Theory, was originally published in 1928 and has been in print in German ever since. This volume makes Schmitt's masterpiece of comparative constitutionalism available to English-language readers for the first time. Schmitt is considered by many to be one of the most original—and, because of his collaboration with the Nazi party, controversial—political thinkers of the twentieth century. This edition includes an introduction by Jeffrey Seitzer and Christopher Thornhill outlining the cultural, intellectual, and political contexts in which Schmitt wrote Constitutional Theory; they point out what is distinctive about the work, examine its reception in the postwar era, and consider its larger theoretical ramifications. This volume also contains extensive editorial notes and a translation of the Weimar Constitution.

As the account makes clear, Muslim Spain was always an integral part of the main literary and intellectual stream of the East and as such was as Islamic as Syria or Egypt. Thus the history is important for an understanding of Islamic culture as a whole and of the interaction

of people and ideas. The author shows that the interdependence and continuity of Muslim culture through its long history was nurtured by the unhampered travel of students and scholars and the circulation of publications throughout the width and breadth of the Islamic Empire, notwithstanding the political division that separated Muslim Spain from the center of Islam. The first five chapter of the book describe, dynasty by dynasty, the Muslims' conquest and rule. The remaining chapters discuss in detail all aspects of Hispano-Arabic culture. Among the subjects are the social structure, the sciences and education, Arabic and linguistic studies, prose and belles lettres, poetry, history, geography, and travel, courtly love, religion, philosophy and mysticism, the natural sciences, and architecture, the minor arts, and music. The book is illustrated with photographs, drawings, and maps, and there is an extensive bibliography.

This volume is the result of a conference at University College London in 2007 which addressed the scale and form of civil defences in early medieval Europe, c. 800-1000. Previous work has largely focussed on individual sites or specific categories of evidence. These papers offer new interdisciplinary perspectives driven by a landscape approach. Several contributions focus on civil defence in England around the time of King Alfred the Great, and together provide a new agenda for the study of Anglo-Saxon military landscapes. European case-studies facilitate a comparative approach to local and regional defensive structures and interpretive paradigms. Topics and themes covered include civil defence landscapes, the organization and form of defensive structures, and the relationships and dynamics between social complexity, militarization, and external threats. With papers ranging from England to Spain and Germany to Scandinavia the volume is of relevance to a range of disciplines including archaeology, history, onomastics, geography, and anthropology.

Grenzräume und Grenzüberschreitungen im Vergleich

The articles of this book, dated between 2011 and 2017, represent the final results of an investigation of solid-state phase transitions undertaken by Yuri Mnyukh in 1959. The initial purpose of the study was to reveal how a crystal structure changes into a different structure. A number of key experimental discoveries by Mnyukh and his graduate students had shown that the process is always a crystal growth. From these experiments the nucleation-and-growth molecular mechanism of phase transitions was deducted. The results of the Mnyukh's investigations far exceeded their original purpose. The discovered mechanism of phase transitions turned out to be the universal tool to unravel the physical nature of basic phenomena of solid-state physics. The second-order phase transitions were shown to be nonexistent and the detrimental effects of their theory by Landau on solid-state physics were made evident. The origin of ferromagnetism was accounted for. The molecular mechanism of ferromagnetic transitions, as well as of a magnetization process was explained. The fallacy of the Heisenberg theory of ferromagnetism was demonstrated. The origin of ferroelectricity and the cause of its parallelism with ferromagnetism was uncovered. The mechanism of phase transitions in superconductors was specified. The great enigma of theoretical physics - "heat capacity lambda-anomalies" in solids and liquid He was eliminated. The theories of critical phenomena in condensed matter was shown to be erroneous and superfluous. The reader will find all that in this book.

This Hebrew poet, known by his Catilian name, Santob de Carrión, lived in the first half of the fourteenth century. In this text, originally published in 1947, Professor Llubera offers a critical edition, giving the text of the work and a full and detailed introduction to Proverbios Morale.

Cuadernos abulenses

A bold new history of the rise of the medieval Italian commune Amid the disintegration of the Kingdom of Italy in the eleventh and twelfth centuries, a new form of collective government—the commune—arose in the cities of northern and central Italy. Sleepwalking into a New World takes a bold new look at how these autonomous city-states came about, and fundamentally alters our understanding of one of the most important political and cultural innovations of the medieval world. Chris Wickham provides richly textured portraits of three cities—Milan, Pisa, and Rome—and sets them against a vibrant backcloth of other towns. He argues that, in all but a few cases, the elites of these cities and towns developed one of the first nonmonarchical forms of government in medieval Europe, unaware that they were creating something altogether new. Wickham makes clear that the Italian city commune was by no means a democracy in the modern sense, but that it was so novel that outsiders did not know what to make of it. He describes how, as the old order unraveled, the communes emerged, governed by consular elites "chosen by the people," and subject to neither emperor nor king. They regularly fought each other, yet they grew organized and confident enough to ally together to defeat Frederick Barbarossa, the German emperor, at the Battle of Legnano in 1176. Sleepwalking into a New World reveals how the development of the autonomous city-state took place, which would in the end make possible the robust civic culture of the Renaissance.

Bibliografias de historia de España

The kingdom of Valencia was home to Christian Spain's largest Muslim population during the reign of the Catholic Monarchs, Fernando and Isabel. How did Muslim-Christian coexistence in Valencia remain relatively stable in this volatile period that saw the establishment of the Spanish Inquisition, the Expulsion of the Jews, the conquest of Granada, and the conversion of the Muslims of Granada and Castile? In explanation, Mark Meyerson achieves the first thorough analysis of Fernando and Isabel's policy toward both Muslims and Jews. His findings will stimulate much discussion among Hispanists, Arabists, and historians. Meyerson argues that the key to the persistence of Muslim-Christian coexistence in Valencia lies in the hitherto unexamined differences between the royal couple concerning matters of religion. More than a study of the minority policy of the Catholic Monarchs, however, The Muslims of Valencia is an exemplary analysis of the economic life of Valencia's Muslims and the complex institutional and social network that held them suspended "between coexistence and crusade."
