Since that time, examples have been recorded by Arndt² Kyrle and mcdonagh,³ Reines⁴ and Bachrach,⁵ in England and on the Continent, and by myself⁶ in this Country. It is probable, as Pinkus has suggested, that the disorder is not nearly so rare as the literature would indicate. Owing to the absence Of subjective symptoms, many cases are undoubt edly overlooked.
