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Up-Country Girl

Up-Country Girl also affords the reader a truthful and accurate portrayal of African culture. As a creative writer, the author wrote *Nothing So Sweet* which won First Prize in a British Council competition; several short stories which were broadcast by the B.B.C; *Folktales and Fables* published by Penguin Books, and short stories included in two recent anthologies. As an educationist, she is best known as the co-author of secondary school textbooks: *New Practical English* by Ogundipe and Tregidgo, and *Brighter Grammar*. She lives in Charlotte, North Carolina.
