### Frankreich-Jahrbuch 2000

On the 70th anniversary of Joseph Roth's death, this volume examines the current relevance of his work. His works and opinions were regarded as being overly oriented towards the past; his leanings towards the monarchy were mocked, his call to supranational thinking interpreted as a simple response to contemporary events. He was read chiefly as the narrator of the vanished Habsburg empire or of the vanished Eastern European Jewry. Today, at a time that Europe is uniting, one gains a different picture: it no longer seems strange that he regarded ideological commitments as an excessively tight corset and viewed himself as a bridge between East and West. The elements of supranationality and interculturality in his work and life can now be acknowledged.

# Französische Theaterfilme - zwischen Surrealismus und Existentialismus

Per tre mesi, fra il settembre e il novembre 1925, Roth vagabondò per il Sud della Francia. Quel viaggio fu accompagnato, per lui, da un senso di liberazione: a trent'anni scopriva le «città bianche» della Provenza, che aveva sognato durante una grigia infanzia. E al tempo stesso sentiva allontanarsi ogni oppressiva germanicità. Sperimentava un nuovo modo di respirare: «Ho guadagnato la libertà di passeggiare, tra signore e signori, tra cantanti di strada e mendicanti, con le mani nelle tasche dei calzoni, una contromarca di guardaroba appuntata sul cappello e un ombrello rotto in mano». Il Sud che si schiudeva ai suoi occhi, con i suoi tre colori fondamentali – «la pietra bianca, il cielo blu, il verde scuro dei giardini» –, sembrava ancora ignaro «delle valanghe che lentamente rotolano verso di noi». Così nacquero queste pagine, tra le più felici di tutto Roth. Felici per l'euforia da cui emanano, e felici anche per lo stile mirabilmente terso e sinuoso. Roth s'inoltrò nel Sud della Francia come nell'«infanzia dell'Europa», dove erano confluite «le più disparate linfe vitali» senza perdere nulla della loro peculiarità. Quel passato e quella natura gli apparvero come la prefigurazione dell'unico avvenire in cui avrebbe voluto vivere. Lasciando il paese luminoso che fino a pochi giorni prima gli era ignoto e dove ora si sentiva già «a casa propria», Roth sapeva di portare «con sé ciò che di più prezioso una

patria può donare: la nostalgia». Questo libro è apparso postumo, nel 1956, con il titolo "Im mittäglichen Frankreich\

Not since The Diary of Anne Frank has there been such a book as this: The joyful but ultimately heartbreaking journal of a young Jewish woman in occupied Paris, now being published for the first time, 63 years after her death in a Nazi concentration camp. On April 7, 1942, Hélène Berr, a 21-year-old Jewish student of English literature at the Sorbonne, took up her pen and started to keep a journal, writing with verve and style about her everyday life in Paris — about her studies, her friends, her growing affection for the "boy with the grey eyes," about the sun in the dewdrops, and about the effect of the growing restrictions imposed by France's Nazi occupiers. Berr brought a keen literary sensibility to her writing, a talent that renders the story it relates all the more rich, all the more heartbreaking. The first day Berr has to wear the yellow star on her coat, she writes, "I held my head high and looked people so straight in the eye they turned away. But it's hard." More, many more, humiliations were to follow, which she records, now with a view to posterity. She wants the journal to go to her fiancé, who has enrolled with the Free French Forces, as she knows she may not live much longer. She was right. The final entry is dated February 15, 1944, and ends with the chilling words: "Horror! Horror!" Berr and her family were arrested three weeks later. She went — as was discovered later — on the death march from Auschwitz to Bergen-Belsen, where she died of typhus in April 1945, within a month of Anne Frank and just days before the liberation of the camp. The journal did eventually reach her fiancé, and for over fifty years it was kept private. In 2002, it was donated to the Memorial of the Shoah in Paris. Before it was first published in France in January 2008, translation rights had already been sold for twelve languages.

### Werke

With brilliantly vivid irony, a mosaic of voices tells the true story of Switzerland's most notorious bank robbers: Kurt Sandweg and Waldemar Velte. As 1933 draws to a close, the pair arrive in Basel from Wuppertal, Germany. Rebels on the run, they are searching for an escape from the confines of a callously regimented society left impoverished by the Depression and the onset of Nazi power. However, their desperation leads them to a realm outside reality, on a destructive path of vengeance for the world's abhorrent lack of justice. Resolute on their doomed mission, neither expected to fall in love. Seen through the benign eyes of Dorly Schupp, the agonising humanity of their relationships are sharply juxtaposed against the reckless cruelty of their crimes.
