From the legendary giant Australian worm that stretches to ten feet in length to the modest nightcrawler that wormed its way into the heart of Darwin's last book to the energetic red wigglers in Stewart's compost bin, *The Earth Moved* gives worms their due and exposes their hidden and extraordinary universe. Earth Moved

A fourth chapter examines the interdependency of local and global eco-relations in *Cymbeline*, and the final chapter explores Darwinian micro-ecologies in *Hamlet* and *Antony and Cleopatra*. An epilogue suggests that Shakespeare's greatest potential for mobilizing modern ecological ideas and practices lies in contemporary performance. *Shakespeare and Ecology* illuminates the historical antecedents of modern ecological knowledge and activism, and explores Shakespeare's capacity for generating imaginative and performative responses to today's environmental challenges.
