A Sweet Taste of Africa

This review seeks to examine the dimensions of poverty in general and chronic poverty in particular in West African countries. West Africa consists largely of low income countries, with a median Gross National Income per capita in 2000 of US\$330, suggesting widespread or generalised poverty. On the basis of the purchasing power parity US\$2 a day poverty line the incidence of poverty amongst ten West African countries that are least developed ranged between 60% and 94% during 1995-2000. This evidence of widespread severe poverty in the region is suggestive of a substantial proportion of the population being poor over extended periods of time.
