The metaphor of the mountain depicts powerful dark forces in our world, historical racism stemming from imperialism, the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, and the more sinister spiritual forces of Satan and his kingdom that animate the evil of the material world. Each poem builds upon one another to make up a thematic whole and leads the reader from darkness to light.
