Ed Lee is an unassuming monosyllable of a man assigned to the Defense Department's Syzygy Project. He is a computer genius of unparalleled talent, working for peanuts "in the basement" when he could be making millions of dollars a month in the private sector. To the government, Ed Lee is a godsend. He may also be the most prolific child-killer in the history of mankind. Were it not for an equally brilliant psychiatrist named Dr. Gerald Harris, Lee's sinister secret might never have been revealed. Dr. Harris is a popular veteran of the FBI's Behavior Analysis Unit, working out of its office in Atlanta. He made a name for himself as a young forensic investigator during the Missing and Murdered case when dozens of children were killed during the 1980's. Understanding the pathology of violent child predators is his forte, and no one in the world has better credentials than he. Certainly, to any rational person, Ed Lee must be insane. But Jerry Harris isn't so sure. He is perplexed and later haunted by Lee's bizarre obsession with angels and his insistence that they are on here on earth with an unholy agenda of mayhem and sin. Lee tells him that angels are the jealous first-born of God and that they will never be sated until they infect all of humanity "with the seminal ingots of vice" that they bring with them like a venereal disease. The doctor is also fascinated by Lee's thesis, predicated on the Heisenberg Uncertainty Principle, that these beings can be both "here and not here" at the same time. Such is the nature of angels, he says, to exist in the "enharmonic intervals" of dimensions. . Borrowing from some of the most sophisticated and controversial theories in particle physics, Ed Lee talks of pyramids as super-conducting machines that, among other things, may be "leaking future." Ed also reveals that he is a member of a sect long thought to be rooted in mythology but is very much alive and well today... the Pythagoreans. He then explains that there is an ongoing and savage war between them and the Masons, whom he despises. Spotting one during his interrogation he sneers provocatively, "A daemonibus docetur, de daemonibus docet, et ad daemons ducit." "It is taught by the demons, it teaches about the demons, and it leads to the demons." The words are an archaic warning associated with Masonic ritual. Ed Lee is eventually executed, (despite the ghoulish efforts of the "alphabet spook" agencies to revive him.) It is then that Dr. Harris' real journey through the mysteries begins. Secrets are revealed, demons are confronted, and the very foundation of Christianity is turned upside down in a fast-paced story that travels through space and time.

After Archangels materialise over the bloodbaths of WWII, they take up residence in most of the world's major cities. But what would happen if, more than a quarter of a century later, something somehow managed to kill these supreme beings? Killarney knows and, as an agent working for the Bureau, a British agency that's so secret it doesn't officially exist, she finds herself embroiled in the

Angels and Demons

Milton's Paradise Lost, the most eloquent, most intellectually daring, most learned, and most sublime poem in the English language, is a poem about angels. Angels did not disappear in Reformation theology: though centuries of Catholic traditions were stripped away, Protestants used them in inventive ways, adapting tradition to new doctrines and to shifting perceptions of the world. Angels continued to inhabit all kinds of writing, and shape the experience and understanding of the world. Milton's Angels: The Early-Modern Imagination explores the fate of angels in Reformation Britain, and shows how and why Paradise Lost is a poem about angels that is both shockingly literal and sublimely imaginative.

Angels Elect and Evil

Provides convincing evidence that angels, demons, and fallen angels were flesh-and-blood members of a giant race predating humanity, spoken of in the Bible as the Nephilim. • Indicates that the earthly paradise of Eden was a realm in the mountains of Kurdistan. • By the author of Gateway to Atlantis. Our mythology describes how beings of great beauty and intelligence, who served as messengers of gods, fell from grace through pride. These angels, also known as Watchers, are spoken of in the Bible and other religious texts as lusting after human women, who lay with them and gave birth to giant offspring called the Nephilim. These religious sources also record how these beings revealed forbidden arts and sciences to humanity--transgressions that led to their destruction in the Great Flood. Andrew Collins reveals that these angels, demons, and fallen angels were flesh-and-blood members of a race predating our own. He offers evidence that they lived in Egypt (prior to the ancient Egyptians), where they built the Sphinx and other megalithic monuments, before leaving the region for what is now eastern Turkey following the cataclysms that accompanied the last Ice Age. Here they lived in isolation before gradually establishing contact with the developing human societies of the Mesopotamian plains below. Humanity regarded these angels--described as tall, white-haired beings with viperlike faces and burning eyes--as gods and their realm the paradise wherein grew the tree of knowledge. Andrew Collins demonstrates how the legends behind the fall of the Watchers echo the faded memory of actual historical events and that the legacy they have left humanity is one we can afford to ignore only at our own peril.

Knight in the Nighttime

'Peaceful' is the most common entry in the visitors' book of fifteenth-century St Michael's Church, with its glorious angel roof and its medieval Doom painting. But away from the church, and beneath the idyllic veneer, the tiny Norfolk village of Walston is anything but harmonious. The Rector's new bride, Becca Thorncroft, is receiving phone calls so unpleasant that her very sanity is at stake; and the newest residents of Walston, Gillian English and Lou Sutherland, are not exactly welcomed with open arms. Then sudden, gruesome death shatters any remaining semblance of serenity.
