A groundbreaking history of the ethics of war in the ancient Near East *Origins of the Just War* reveals the incredible richness and complexity of ethical thought about war in the three millennia preceding the Greco-Roman period, establishing the extent to which ancient just war thought prefigured much of what we now consider to be the building blocks of the Western just war tradition. In this incisive and elegantly written book, Rory Cox traces the earliest ideas concerning the complex relationship between war, ethics and justice. Excavating the ethical thought of three ancient Near Eastern cultures—Egyptian, Hittite and Israelite—he demonstrates that the history of the just war is considerably more ancient and geographically diffuse than previously assumed. Cox shows how the emergence of just war thought was grounded in a desire to rationalise, sacralise and ultimately to legitimise the violence of war. Rather than restraining or condemning warfare, the earliest ethical thought about war reflected an urge to justify state violence. Cox terms this presumption in favour of war *ius pro bello*—the “right for war”—characterizing it as a meeting point of both abstract and pragmatic concerns. Drawing on a diverse range of ancient sources, *Origins of the Just War* argues that the same imperative still underlies many of the assumptions of contemporary just war thought and highlights the risks of applying moral absolutism to the fraught ethical arena of war.

The Holy War is an allegorical story which describes a conflict raging in the town of Mansoul - "Man's Soul" - as a consequence of the townspeople being deceived into casting off the benevolent and just rule of its king, Shaddai. Diabolus, who is the story's representation of Satan, is seen to win certain figures to his cause through lies delivered with silky, ruinous speechcraft. Various emotions, virtues and attributes of humankind receive characterization, as we witness Mansoul's plight ensue and wonder whether the town will survive. John Bunyan was a religious scholar who held the Bible and other ancient, holy texts in the greatest regard. This story's narrative frequently corresponds to events depicted in the Biblical Old Testament; man's fall and redemption through God form the essence of The Holy War. Today, this story is considered an early classic of Christian literature. Unlike other, abridged editions, this version of The Holy War retains the introductory poem penned by Bunyan, together with a short preface. The updates to the English are adapted from an edition published in 1907, which strove to preserve the expressions and poignant, literary depth of the original prose.

For a world mired in catastrophe, nothing could be more urgent than the question of survival. In this theoretically and methodologically groundbreaking book, Adam Y. Stern calls for a critical reevaluation of survival as a contemporary regime of representation. In *Survival*, Stern asks what texts, what institutions, and what traditions have made survival a recognizable element of our current political vocabulary. The book begins by suggesting that the interpretive key lies in the discursive prominence of "Jewish survival." Yet the Jewish example, he argues, is less a marker of Jewish history than an index of Christianity's impact on the modern, secular, political imagination. With this inversion, the book repositions Jewish survival as the supplemental effect and mask of a more capacious political theology of Christian survival. The argument proceeds by taking major moments in twentieth-century philosophy, theology, and political theory as occasions for collecting the scattered elements of survival's theological-political archive. Through readings of canonical texts by secular and Jewish thinkers—Hannah

Arendt, Walter Benjamin, Franz Rosenzweig, and Sigmund Freud—Stern shows that survival belongs to a history of debates about the sovereignty and subjection of Christ's body. Interrogating survival as a rhetorical formation, the book intervenes in discussions about biopolitics, secularism, political theology, and the philosophy of religion.
